Trustees' report
For the Year Ended 31 August 2024

The trustees present their annual report together with the financial statements and auditor's report of the charitable company for the year 1st September 2023 to 31st August 2024. The annual report serves the purposes of both a trustees' report, and a directors' report under company law.

The academy trust operates eight academies for pupils aged 3 to 19 serving a catchment area in Redbridge, Barking and Dagenham. It has a pupil capacity of 3,510 and had a roll of 3,210 in the school census on October 2023.

Structure, governance and management

a. Constitution

The Academy is a charitable company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity.

The charitable company's memorandum and articles of association are the primary governing documents of the academy trust.

The Trustees of The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust are also the directors of the charitable company for the purposes of company law.

The charitable company operates as The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust.

Details of the Trustees who served during the , and to the date these accounts are approved are included in the Reference and administrative details on page 1.

b. Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the charitable company in the event of it being wound up while they are a member, or within one year after they cease to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10, for the debts and liabilities contracted before they ceased to be a member.

c. Trustees' indemnities

Since the incorporation of the Charitable Company on 1st August 2011 the Trustees have been indemnified in respect of their legal liability for financial loss as a result of a negligent act, accidental error or omission in the course of their official duties. The limit of this indemnity is £25,000,000.

d. Method of recruitment and appointment or election of Trustees

Trustees – The Diocesan Bishop may appoint up to 9 Trustees.

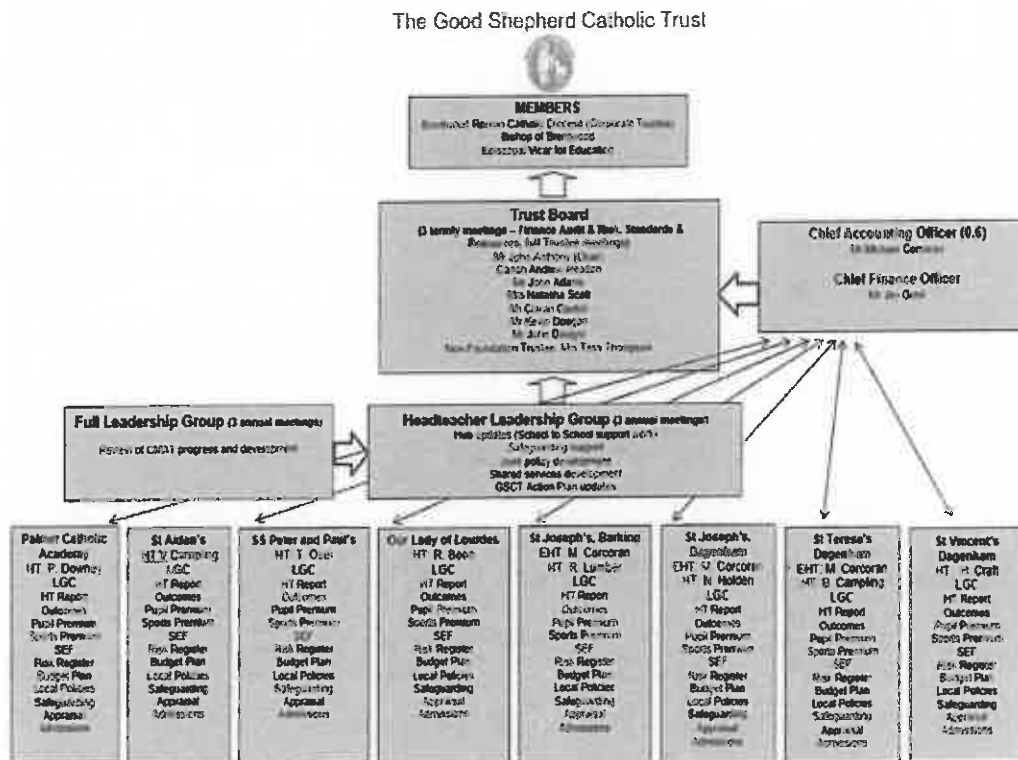
e. Policies adopted for the induction and training of Trustees

j. Engagement with employees (including disabled persons)

The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust publishes a regular 'Trust Bulletin' which is distributed to schools. This monthly update provides schools and employees with information on matters of concern to them. Each school completes an annual feedback survey which provides an opportunity for schools and their employees to provide feedback on the trust's service providers as well as the trusts performance and provision as a whole.

The Trusts annual 'Action Plan' provides a review of the company's previous year as well as key performance indicators for the year ahead which cover the main areas of staffing, standards, finance, buildings etc.

The Trust's schools are required to have a single equality policy and statement in place to ensure that all applications for employment from disabled persons and treatment of employees who become disabled are treated in line with the equality policy.

b. Objectives, strategies and activities

The Trustees are determined to maintain the traditional ethos, values, standards and achievements of the academy, whilst continuing to work to fulfil the academy's medium and longer term development plans.

The aims of the Trust rest on the following principles:

The advancement for the public benefit education in the United Kingdom, in particular but without prejudice by establishing, maintaining, carrying on, managing and developing a Catholic Academies which shall offer a broad and balanced curriculum and shall be conducted in accordance with the principles, practices and tenets of the Catholic Church and all Catholic Canon Law applying thereto including any trust deed governing the use of the land used by the Academies both generally and in particular in relation to arranging for religious education and daily acts of worship and having regard to advice and following directives issued by the Diocesan Bishop.

The main objectives of the Trust for the year ended 31st August 2024 is summarised below:

- To ensure that every student receives high quality education in terms of resourcing, tuition and care based on Gospel values.
- Secure increased achievement of all groups of learners at key stage 1, stage 2, stage 4 and post 16.
- Continue to develop leadership capacity and achievement.
- To improve the effectiveness of the Trust by continual review of the curriculum and organisational structure.
- To improve the progress and outcomes of all being taught in the Trust.
- Robust governance and oversight of the strategic direction and finances of the Trust.
- To ensure the operation of the Trust demonstrates good value for money and efficient and effective use of resources.
- To ensure that standards are continually raised within the Trust, the Trustees and the Leadership Teams.
- Operates a robust quality assurance calendar which monitors the quality of teaching, learning and outcomes.
- Evaluates, monitors and supports curriculum departments and other aspects of the Trust to secure outcomes.

c. Public benefit

The Trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on Public Benefit. The key public benefit delivered by The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust is the maintenance and development of the high-quality education provided by the schools for over 50 years, to the young people of Ilford and the surrounding parishes. Achievements and performance

Over the 2023-24 academic year, the Headteachers of the trust schools had 4 planned, formal meetings throughout the year as the 'Leadership Group', which acts as an advisory board to the trustees. The Chair of Governors join these Leadership Group meetings three times a year. The meetings focus on improving the Good Shepherd Catholic Trust and strengthening provision for the pupils in each of our schools, now that a stable and strong central set of services and trust structure has been established.

The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust is founded on the principle of the common good and subsidiarity. We ensure that our trust's central authority only has a subsidiary function, performing only those tasks which cannot be performed more effectively and economically at a local level, by the schools and LGCs.

We have an annually updated 3-year action plan in place that includes our Key Performance Indicators and a 'School to school' support matrix which summarises the areas of support and development for each of the trust schools, which should form the heart of the trust's work going forward.

During the course of the 2023-24 academic year a number of procurement processes were overseen by the CAO and CFO to try and secure best value for the schools within the trust. This included procuring catering and cleaning services as well as a new ICT support provider for four trust schools. All of these have seen savings for the schools involved and each school has been offered participation in the process or retain their current preferred provider, based upon cost and best value.

Following two new Headteacher appointments in January 2024 the trust has seen no further changes to the Headteacher/leadership posts within any of the trust schools.

b. Going concern

After making appropriate enquiries, the board of trustees has a reasonable expectation that the academy trust has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason, it continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Statement of Accounting Policies.

c. Promoting the success of the company

The directors of the Good Shepherd Catholic Trust acknowledge their commitment to act in a way most likely to promote the success of the company. In doing so we pay particular regard to;

The likely consequences of any decision in the long term by planning over a minimum of a 3-to-5-year period and ensuring that all arrangements are reviewed annually to help ensure the long-term stability and growth of the trust.

The interests of the company's employees by ensuring all staff policies and procedures follow best practice and are guided by our professional HR and personnel services.

The need to foster the company's business relationships with suppliers, customers and others.

The impact of the company's operations on the community and the environment by carrying out regular consultations, parent meetings and surveys at academy level to engage with the local community and local area.

The desirability of the company maintaining a reputation for high standards of business conduct by ensuring the highest standards of education continue to be provided and compare favourably to local and national outcomes. Our leadership of trust and schools set an exemplary standard and putting the pupils at the heart of all decisions the academies and trust make.

The need to act fairly as between members of the company by ensuring an effective and well-structured reporting system which enables effective communication to all members, trustees and leadership team members.

Financial review

In the current climate of uncertainty about future funding and fluctuations in pupil numbers, Trustees have made it a priority to ensure that high standards are maintained within the framework of a budget that is sustainable, and have been rigorous in evaluating any proposals for additional expenditure.

Most of the Trust's income is obtained from the Department for Education via the Education Funding Agency in the form of the General Annual Grant (GAG), the use of which is restricted to particular purposes; i.e. the objects of the Academy Trust. The GAG received during the period covered by this report and the associated expenditure are shown as restricted funds in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Funds have also been received from students to pay for a wide range of educational visits and activities and these have been applied to the associated costs.

The Trust received the Devolved Formula Capital Grant (DFC) which in accordance with the Charities SORP 2019, is shown in the Statement of Financial Activities as restricted fixed asset funds. The balance sheet restricted fixed asset fund is reduced by depreciation charges over the expected useful life of the assets concerned.

Expenditure for the period covered by this report was covered by the GAG received from the DfE and other income, such as voluntary income, activities for generating funds and investment income. The Trustees are concerned with the large deficit that the Local Government Pension Fund is reporting.

Key financial policies adopted or reviewed during the year include the Finance Policy which establishes Reserves Policy.

a. Reserves policy

The Trust is aware of the requirement to balance current and future needs. The Trust always aims to set a balanced budget.

After careful analysis the Trust has deemed that the adequate range of reserves should be no greater than 5-20% of combined restricted and unrestricted general annual grant.

The Trust's current level of free reserves is £362,646 (2023 - £318,428) (total funds less the amount held in fixed assets and restricted funds).

b. Investment policy

Apart from cash held for the operation of the Trust, The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust has no realisable investments. With respect to its cash holdings the Trust has adopted a low-risk strategy. In addition to the main current account the Academies maintain an instant access deposit account. Suitable sweeping and switching procedures are in place at the Academies bankers to ensure that adequate funds are available in the current account whilst maintaining a balance in the deposit account as high as possible

c. Principal risks and uncertainties

The Trusts activities expose it primarily to cash flow risk. The Trust continually monitors cash flows to ensure the Academy Trust has sufficient funds available to meet debts as they fall due. The Governing Body maintains significant cash reserves at all times.

The principal risks and uncertainties facing the Trust are as follows:

Financial Risk – The Trust is operating in a period of considerable financial uncertainty with regard to public funding. Variations year on year in the numbers of Primary pupils and 6th form students joining the Trust, stemming from local demographic trends is having an effect upon funding levels; year on year reductions in the per capita funding of students in the Trust; and the deficit in the Local Government Pension Scheme, possibly leading to an increase in employer contribution rates.

Failures in governance and/or management - The risk in this area arises from potential failure to effectively manage the Trust finances, internal controls, compliance with regulations and legislation, statutory returns, etc. The Trustees continue to review and ensure that appropriate measures are in place to mitigate these risks.

Reputational - The continuing success of the Academy Trust depends on maintaining the highest educational standards in order to continue to attract applicants in sufficient numbers. To mitigate this risk Trustees to ensure that student success and achievement are closely monitored and reviewed.

Safeguarding and child protection - Trustees continue to ensure that the highest standards are maintained in the selection and monitoring of staff and volunteers, the operation of child safeguarding policies and procedures, health & safety, training, support and discipline, in order to protect vulnerable young people in its care.

Staffing - The success of the Academies is reliant on the quality of its staff and so the Trustees monitor and review policies and procedures to ensure continued development and training of staff as well as ensuring there is clear succession planning to minimise the risk resulting from major changes in key staff.

Fraud and mismanagement of funds - The Trust uses the services of an external auditor to carry out checks on financial systems and records as required by the Academy Financial Handbook. All finance staff receive training to keep them up to date with financial practice requirements and develop their skills in this area.

The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust has a robust risk management regime in place which has been developed with a formal, trust-wide risk management portal for 2023-24.

Fundraising

The academy trust does not use any external fundraisers. All fundraising undertaken during the year was monitored by the Trustees.

Plans for future periods

Central to the work of The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust is its commitment to further develop and enhance the educational experience of its pupils and students at all levels. Additionally, it will continue its efforts to improve the achievements of its pupils and students, not only in academic subjects but also in its holistic approach to educating young people including extracurricular activities and in essential life skills; so as to increase the number of opportunities open to its students when they move on to further training, apprenticeships or higher education and ultimately employment.

The Trustees recognise that through good financial management they have been able to invest and improve significantly the quality of the built environment of the Academies. The Trust wish to continue this programme of developments to further improve the teaching spaces and facilities for both staff and students.

The Trust:

- Will continue to aim to attract high calibre teachers and support staff in order to deliver its objectives;
- Will continue to work with partner schools to improve the educational opportunities for students in the wider community;
- Will continue to seek capital investment to improve facilities;
- Will continue to promote a wide range of extra-curricular activities;
- Will continue to raise standards through improved data collection and intervention strategies;
- Will manage finances efficiently and effectively in order to ensure value for money;
- Will continue with the on-going push in improving outcomes for the young people it serves;

Review of value for money

As accounting officer, the CAO has responsibility for ensuring that the academy trust delivers good value in the use of public resources. Over the last financial period, The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust has continued to take a wide range of steps to ensure that the education standards and levels of attainment for all pupils have continued to improve.

The Trust has focussed on improving the quality of teaching across the academies by ensuring teachers set challenging targets for pupils, by ensuring teachers provide feedback to pupils that helps move their learning forward and by involving parents and children more in their education. The Academies have continued to keep the staffing structure under review.

The Board of Trustee approves the budget each year and is mindful of the need to balance expenditure against income to ensure that The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust continues to develop. The Board of Trustees also received and approves the Annual Accounts and the External Auditors Management Report.

Monthly budget monitoring reports are produced and reviewed regularly by the Business Manager and the Head teacher of each individual academy. Any necessary remedial action is taken to address any significant variances that may have an impact on the budget outcome. This has ensured that spending is within budget and forward plans are agreed and implemented. This regular monitoring ensures the best use of resources and prevents waste.

The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust deploys equipment, materials and services to provide pupil / student and staff with resources which support quality of teaching and quality of learning.

Contract evaluation exercises are routinely undertaken to assess all contracts against the marketplace to ensure that these remain competitive.

The purpose of the system of internal control

The system of internal control is designed to manage risk to a reasonable level rather than to eliminate all risk of failure to achieve policies, aims and objectives. It can, therefore, only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance of effectiveness. The system of internal control is based on an on-going process designed to identify and prioritise the risks to the achievement of academy trust policies, aims and objectives, to evaluate the likelihood of those risks being realised and the impact should they be realised, and to manage them efficiently, effectively and economically. The system of internal control has been in place in the Good Shepherd Catholic Trust for the period 01 September 2023 to 31 August 2024 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements.

Capacity to handle risk

The board of trustees has reviewed the key risks to which the academy trust is exposed, together with the operating, financial and compliance controls that have been implemented to mitigate those risks. The board of trustees is of the view that there is a formal on-going process for identifying, evaluating and managing the academy trust's significant risks that has been in place for the period 01 September 2023 to 31 August 2024 and up to the date of approval of the annual report and financial statements. This process is regularly reviewed by the board of trustees.

The risk and control framework

The Academy's system of internal financial control is based on a framework of regular management information and administrative procedures including the segregation of duties and a system of delegation and accountability. In particular, it includes:

- comprehensive budgeting and monitoring systems with an annual budget and periodic financial reports which are reviewed and agreed by the board of Trustees
- regular reviews by the Board of Trustees reports which indicate financial performance against the forecasts and of major purchase plans, capital works and expenditure programmes
- setting targets to measure financial and other performance
- clearly defined purchasing (asset purchase or capital investment) guidelines
- identification and management of risks

The Board of Trustees has decided to buy-in an internal audit service from Price Bailey LLP.

This option has been chosen because it provides a professional and comprehensive internal audit process to help support the Good Shepherd Catholic Trust.

The internal auditor's role includes giving advice on financial and other matters and performing a range of checks on the academy trust's financial and other systems. In particular, the checks carried out in the current period included:

- testing of risk management
- testing of key financial controls

On an annual basis, the auditor reports to the board of trustees, through the Finance, Risk and Audit committee on the operation of the systems of control and on the discharge of the board of trustees' financial responsibilities. On an annual basis the auditor prepare a summary report to the committee outlining the areas reviewed, key findings, recommendations and conclusions to help the committee consider actions and assess year on year progress.

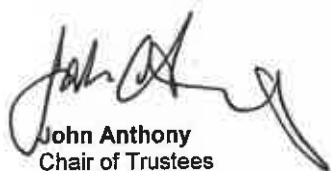

1. General information

The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee and an exempt charity incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is C/O Londoneast (UK) Ltd, Yewtree Avenue, Dagenham, Essex, England, RM10 7FN.

The principal activity of the academy trust is to provide a primary education for pupils that satisfies the requirements of the Education Act 2002.

2. Accounting policies

A summary of the principal accounting policies adopted (which have been applied consistently, except where noted), judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty, is set out below.

2.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements of the Academy, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared under the historic cost convention in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard Applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Academies Accounts Direction 2023 to 2024 issued by ESFA, the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006.

The Good Shepherd Catholic Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

The financial statements were prepared in sterling to the nearest pound.

2.2 Going concern

The Trustees assess whether the use of going concern is appropriate i.e. whether there are any material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the Academy to continue as a going concern. The Trustees make this assessment in respect of a period of at least one year from the date of authorisation for issue of the financial statements and have concluded that the Academy has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and there are no material uncertainties about the Academy's ability to continue as a going concern, thus they continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

2.3 Income

All incoming resources are recognised when the Academy has entitlement to the funds, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

• **Grants**

Grants are included in the Statement of financial activities on a receivable basis. The balance of income received for specific purposes but not expended during the period is shown in the relevant funds on the Balance sheet. Where income is received in advance of meeting any performance-related conditions there is not unconditional entitlement to the income and its recognition is deferred and included in creditors as deferred income until the performance-related conditions are met. Where entitlement occurs before income is received, the income is accrued.

General Annual Grant is recognised in full in the Statement of financial activities in the year for which it is receivable and any abatement in respect of the year is deducted from income and recognised as a liability.

Capital grants are recognised in full when there is an unconditional entitlement to the grant. Unspent amounts of capital grants are reflected in the Balance sheet in the restricted fixed asset fund. Capital grants are recognised when there is entitlement and are not deferred over the life of the asset on which they are expended.

• **Donations**

Donations are recognised on a receivable basis (where there are no performance-related conditions) where the receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

• **Other income**

Other income, including the hire of facilities, is recognised in the year it is receivable and to the extent the Academy has provided the goods or services.

• **Transfer on conversion**

Where assets and liabilities are received by the Academy on conversion to an academy, the transferred assets are measured at fair value and recognised in the Balance sheet at the point when the risks and rewards of ownership pass to the Academy. An equal amount of income is recognised as a transfer on conversion within 'Income from Donations and Capital Grants' to the net assets received.

2.4 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

• **Expenditure on raising funds**

This includes all expenditure incurred by the Academy to raise funds for its charitable purposes and includes costs of all fundraising activities events and non-charitable trading.

2.4 Expenditure (continued)

• **Charitable activities**

These are costs incurred on the Academy's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the Academy apportioned to charitable activities.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

2.5 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the Academy; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the institution with whom the funds are deposited.

2.6 Taxation

The Academy is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

Accordingly, the Academy is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Part 11, chapter 3 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

2.7 Tangible fixed assets

Assets costing £500 or more are capitalised as tangible fixed assets and are carried at cost, net of depreciation and any provision for impairment.

Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with the aid of specific grants, either from the government or from the private sector, they are included in the Balance sheet at cost and depreciated over their expected useful economic life. Where there are specific conditions attached to the funding requiring the continued use of the asset, the related grants are credited to a restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of financial activities and carried forward in the Balance sheet. Depreciation on the relevant assets is charged directly to the restricted fixed asset fund in the Statement of financial activities. Where tangible fixed assets have been acquired with unrestricted funds, depreciation on such assets is charged to the unrestricted fund.

The academy trust occupies land and buildings at a number of sites which are provided to it and owned by The Brentwood Roman Catholic Diocese Trustee ('the Site Trustee'). The academy trust occupies this land and buildings under the terms of Supplemental Agreements between the Site Trustee, the Secretary of State and the academy trust, which provide the academy trust with the right to use the land and buildings of the Academies for an indefinite period, subject to a 2 year termination notice period, which amounts to a mere licence. Having considered the fact that the academy trust occupies the land and such buildings as may be or may come to be erected on it by a mere licence, which transfers to the academy trust no rights or control over the sites save that of occupying it at the will of the Site Trustee under the terms of the relevant site trust, the Trustees have concluded that the value of the land and buildings occupied by the academy trust will not be recognised on the balance sheet of the academy trust.

As it is the academy trust's policy that land and buildings occupied under Supplemental Agreements do not constitute fixed assets, any improvements to land and buildings occupied under such agreements are not capitalised. Any such expenditure is recognised in support costs as charitable expenditure and allocated to the restricted fixed asset fund.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets other than freehold land and assets under construction, at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

A review for impairment of a fixed asset is carried out if events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of any fixed asset may not be recoverable. Shortfalls between the carrying value of fixed assets and their recoverable amounts are recognised as impairments. Impairment losses are recognised in the Statement of financial activities.

2.8 Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value after making due allowance for obsolete and slow-moving stocks. Cost includes all direct costs and an appropriate proportion of fixed and variable overheads.

2.9 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

2.10 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short-term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

2.11 Liabilities

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the Academy anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide.

2.12 Financial instruments

The Academy only holds basic financial instruments as defined in FRS 102. The financial assets and financial liabilities of the Academy and their measurement bases are as follows:

Financial assets - trade and other debtors are basic financial instruments and are debt instruments measured at amortised cost as detailed in note 20. Prepayments are not financial instruments.

Cash at bank is classified as a basic financial instrument and is measured at face value.

Financial liabilities - trade creditors, accruals and other creditors are financial instruments, and are measured at amortised cost as detailed in notes 21 and 22. Taxation and social security are not included in the financial instruments disclosure definition. Deferred income is not deemed to be a financial liability, as the cash settlement has already taken place and there is an obligation to deliver services rather than cash or another financial instrument.

2.13 Operating leases

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of financial activities on a straight line basis over the lease term.

2.14 Pensions

Retirement benefits to employees of the Academy are provided by the Teachers' Pension Scheme ("TPS") and the Local Government Pension Scheme ("LGPS"). These are defined benefit schemes.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme and contributions are calculated so as to spread the cost of pensions over employees' working lives with the Academy in such a way that the pension cost is a substantially level percentage of current and future pensionable payroll. The contributions are determined by the Government Actuary on the basis of quadrennial valuations using a prospective unit credit method. TPS is an unfunded multi-employer scheme with no underlying assets to assign between employers. Consequently, the TPS is treated as a defined contribution scheme for accounting purposes and the contributions recognised in the period to which they relate.

The LGPS is a funded multi-employer scheme and the assets are held separately from those of the Academy in separate trustee administered funds. Pension scheme assets are measured at fair value and liabilities are measured on an actuarial basis using the projected unit credit method and discounted at a rate equivalent to the current rate of return on a high quality corporate bond of equivalent term and currency to the liabilities. The actuarial valuations are obtained at least triennially and are updated at each Balance sheet date. The amounts charged to operating surplus are the current service costs and the costs of scheme introductions, benefit changes, settlements and curtailments. They are included as part of staff costs as incurred. Net interest on the net defined benefit liability/asset is also recognised in the Statement of financial activities and comprises the interest cost on the defined benefit obligation and interest income on the scheme assets, calculated by multiplying the fair value of the scheme assets at the beginning of the period by the rate used to discount the benefit obligations. The difference between the interest income on the scheme assets and the actual return on the scheme assets is recognised in other recognised gains and losses.

Actuarial gains and losses are recognised immediately in other recognised gains and losses.

2.15 Agency arrangements

The academy trust acts as an agent in distributing 16-19 bursary funds from ESFA. Payments received from ESFA and subsequent disbursements to students are excluded from the statement of financial activities as the academy trust does not have control over the charitable application of the funds. The academy trust can use up to 5% of the allocation towards its own administration costs and this is recognised in the statement of financial activities. The funds received and paid, and any balances held are disclosed in note 35.

2.16 Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds represent those resources which may be used towards meeting any of the charitable objects of the Academy at the discretion of the Trustees.

Restricted fixed asset funds are resources which are to be applied to specific capital purposes imposed by the funders where the asset acquired or created is held for a specific purpose.

Restricted general funds comprise all other restricted funds received with restrictions imposed by the funder/donor and include grants from the Department for Education Group.

Investment income, gains and losses are allocated to the appropriate fund.

3. Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgment

Estimates and judgments are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical accounting estimates and assumptions:

Multi-employer defined benefit pension scheme

The present value of the Local Government Pension Scheme defined benefit liability depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a variety of assumptions. The assumptions used in determining the net cost or income for pensions include the discount rate. Any changes in these assumptions, which are disclosed in note 31, will impact the carrying amount of the pension liability. Furthermore a roll forward approach which projects results from the latest full actuarial valuation performed at 31 March 2022 has been used by the actuary in valuing the pensions liability at 31 August 2024. Any differences between the figures derived from the roll forward approach and a full actuarial valuation would impact on the carrying amount of the pension liability.

Critical areas of judgment:

Useful economic lives of tangible assets

The annual depreciation charge for tangible assets is sensitive to changes in the estimated useful economic lives and residual values of the assets. The useful economic lives and residual values are reassessed annually. They are amended when necessary to reflect current estimates, based on technological advancement, future investments, economic utilisation and the physical condition of the assets. See note 18 for the carrying amount of the property, plant and equipment, and note 2.7 for the useful economic lives of each class of assets.

30. Contingent liabilities

During the period of the funding agreement, should any asset for which a capital grant was received be sold or otherwise disposed of, in the event of the Academy not reinvesting the proceeds, it will be required to pay the grant related proportion of the proceeds to the ESFA.

31. Pension commitments

The Academy's employees belong to two principal pension schemes: the Teachers' Pension Scheme England and Wales (TPS) for academic and related staff; and the Local Government Pension Scheme (LGPS) for non-teaching staff, which is managed by the London Borough of Redbridge. Both are multi-employer defined benefit schemes.

The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS related to the period ended 31 March 2020 and of the LGPS 31 March 2022.

Contributions amounting to £ - were payable to the schemes at 31 August 2024 (2023 - £293,326) and are included within creditors.

Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Teachers' Pension Scheme (TPS) is a statutory, contributory, defined benefit scheme, governed by the Teachers' Pension Scheme Regulations 2014. Membership is automatic for full-time teachers in academies. All teachers have the option to opt-out of the TPS following enrolment.

The TPS is an unfunded scheme to which both the member and employer makes contributions, as a percentage of salary - these contributions are credited to the Exchequer. Retirement and other pension benefits are paid by public funds provided by Parliament.

Valuation of the Teachers' Pension Scheme

The Government Actuary, using normal actuarial principles, conducts a formal actuarial review of the TPS in accordance with the Public Service Pensions (Valuations and Employer Cost Cap) Directions 2014 published by HM Treasury every 4 years. The aim of the review is to ensure scheme costs are recognised and managed appropriately and the review specifies the level of future contributions.

Actuarial scheme valuations are dependent on assumptions about the value of future costs, design of benefits and many other factors. The latest actuarial valuation of the TPS was carried out as at 31 March 2020. The valuation report was published by the Department for Education on 27 October 2023, with the SCAPE rate, set by HMT, applying a notional investment return based on 1.7% above the rate of CPI. The key elements of the valuation outcome are:

- employer contribution rates set at 28.68% of pensionable pay (including a 0.08% administration levy)
- total scheme liabilities (pensions currently in payment and the estimated cost of future benefits) for service to the effective date of £262,000 million and notional assets (estimated future contributions together with the notional investments held at the valuation date) of £222,200 million, giving a notional past service deficit of £39,800 million

The next valuation result is due to be implemented from 1 April 2027.

The employer's pension costs paid to TPS in the year amounted to £2,043,930 (2023 - £1,963,888).

Under the definitions set out in FRS 102, the TPS is an unfunded multi-employer pension scheme. The Academy has accounted for its contributions to the scheme as if it were a defined contribution scheme. The Academy has set out above the information available on the scheme.

Local Government Pension Scheme

The LGPS is a funded defined benefit pension scheme, with the assets held in separate trustee-administered funds. The total contribution made for the year ended 31 August 2024 was £1,082,000 (2023 - £1,098,000), of which employer's contributions totalled £854,000 (2023 - £872,000) and employees' contributions totalled £228,000 (2023 - £226,000). The agreed contribution rates for future years are 26 per cent for employers and variable per cent for employees.

As described in note the LGPS obligation relates to the employees of the Academy, who were the employees transferred as part of the conversion from the maintained school and new employees who were eligible to, and did, join the Scheme in the year. The obligation in respect of employees who transferred on conversion represents their cumulative service at both the predecessor school and the Academy at the balance sheet date.

Parliament has agreed, at the request of the Secretary of State for Education, to a guarantee that, in the event of academy closure, outstanding Local Government Pension Scheme liabilities would be met by the Department for Education. The guarantee came into force on 18 July 2013 and on 21 July 2022, the Department for Education reaffirmed its commitment to the guarantee, with a parliamentary minute published on GOV.UK.

33. Members' liability

Each member of the charitable company undertakes to contribute to the assets of the company in the event of it being wound up while he/she is a member, or within one year after he/she ceases to be a member, such amount as may be required, not exceeding £10 for the debts and liabilities contracted before he/she ceases to be a member.

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34. Related party transactions

Owing to the nature of the Academy and the composition of the Board of Trustees being drawn from local public and private sector organisations, transactions may take place with organisations in which the trustees have an interest. All transactions involving such organisations are conducted in accordance with the requirements of the Academy Trust Handbook, including notifying the ESFA of all transactions made on or after 1 April 2019 and obtaining their approval where required, and with the Academy's financial regulations and normal procurement procedures relating to connected and related party transactions.

A close family member of C Clerkin (a Trustee), is employed by the Academy Trust as a teacher. The staff member's appointment was made in competition and C Clerkin was not involved in the decision-making process regarding appointment. The staff member is paid a competitive salary for her role and received no special treatment as a result of her relationship.

35. Agency arrangements

The academy trust distributes 16-19 bursary funds to students as an agent for ESFA. In the accounting period ending 31 August 2024 the trust received £16,066 (2023 - £15,336) and disbursed £3,941 (2023 - £9,965) from the fund. At the year end, an amount totalling £47,694 (2023 - £35,569) was due back to the ESFA and is included within other creditors above.
